Now hope does not disappoint; because the love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit who was given to us. Romans 5:5 (NKJV)

They had to travel around 112 kilometres from Nazareth to Bethlehem (on foot), this would have been a journey of about a week and for a heavily pregnant young woman would have been quite uncomfortable, challenging and difficult.



One thing about Mary and Joseph is that they demonstrated character and perseverance and are a good example for us in these attributes. Their faith enabled them to overcome many obstacles and as a result the Hope of the World – Christ was born.

2024 has been a particularly significant year for the MCF as we have celebrated

40 years of bringing the Hope of Christ to those who work in Defence. During this year, we have widened our vision to include families and veterans, we have continued to build the relationship with the other ministries within Defence (FCMM) which has also brought many blessings, we have continued to decentralise and encourage the MCF Reps and groups to be more active in their regions rather than a Canberra centric focus.

Can I encourage you all during the Christmas period to take some time for yourself and your families, time to pause, to rest, to reflect and be restored in body, mind and soul.

May you all have a Holy, Christ centred, Hope filled, Blessed and Safe Christmas and New Year.

AMCF Conference Brazil 2024 – overview

Military Christian Fellowships are in 150 countries around the world. The Association of Military Christian Fellowships is a community of Military Christian fellowships (MCFs), and individual military, police and security forces Christians, in over 150 nations. AMCF members encourage and inspire each other in their spiritual growth and service to their nations.

The President of AMCF MAJGEN (Retd) Essel Soriano oversees 14 regions that are led by the vice President of the region. MCF Australia is part of the SW Pacific region whose VP is LTCOL Jamie van Heel, former MCF-A Chairman from 2009-18. Other military countries in the region include Timor Leste, Papua New Guinea, Tonga, Fiji and New Zealand. There are also an additional 8 countries that have police or security forces such as the Solomon Islands, Vanuata, Tuvalu and Micronesia.

Every ten years there is a world conference for the AMCF. This year from 15-20 Oct 24 the world conference was held in Sao Paulo Brazil. There were 1000 delegates from 74 nations. The theme of the AMCF Conference was arise and shine. From the Pacific region seven delegates attended the conference. There were two delegates from Timor Leste CHAP Rui Gomes and LT Tome Soares, two delegates from Tonga, WO1 Toni Langilangi and Reverend Ikani Tolu, one delegate from Fiji CHAP Taniela Tama and two delegates from Australia LTCOL Eric Bettanin currently posted to Timor Leste and LTCOL Jamie van Heel VP SW Pacific.

As we were accommodated together it was a great time of getting to know each other in the Pacific region. There was time to share what was happening in our countries with Christian military ministry and an opportunity to pray with each other. We also met two British soldiers Joe and Anna Seero, originally from Fiji who would like to return to Fiji in a couple of years to support Christian military ministry. CHAP Kurt Mueller from the USA works with the Association of Christian Conferences Teaching and Service (ACCTS) and is looking forward to supporting the SW Pacific region. ACCTS financially supported five Pacific delegates travel and conference fees for which I am very grateful.

Moving forward Jamie Van Heel plans to visit Timor Leste, Fiji and Tonga to encourage MCF leaders there. There may be an opportunity to hold a regional conference in the next few years. Fiji Military Forces Bible



From an email sent to the MCF-A Office at end of October - The Team has just returned from the RFMF Head Quarters (Republic of Fiji Military Forces) where we handed over the RFMF Bibles to the Commander. A traditional handing-over ceremony took place with Senior Officers and Chaplain Team in attendance. The Military Commander conveys his gratitude to BSA, RAMF & Chaplaincy Team, BSSP, and everyone who played a part in bringing this Bible to the RFMF. The arrival of the Bibles was timely as it coincided with the

RFMF Reconciliation Services held within the week and which will conclude in a Church Service on 02nd November.

A reconciliation service was conducted last Tuesday for the CRW and RFMF Units that clashed in the 2000 **Fijian coup** d'état. A Trauma Healing approach was used – "Sharing your Story". According to a Chaplain, that story time went on for 6 hours, and the stories themselves brought healing, peace, and release to CRW families who were for 24 years asking, "What happened to their CRW relatives and loved ones who died during that coup?" Cause of death was a mystery for 24 years.


MCF Office Dec/Jan open hours

Being part of Timor-Leste history – *electric*!



In September 2024, history was made in Timor-Leste as Pope Francis graced the nation with a visit that will be remembered for generations. As part of Australia's Defence Cooperation Program, I was privileged to contribute to the meticulous planning and build-up for this extraordinary event.

Timor-Leste, where 98% of the population identifies as Catholic, embraced this momentous occasion with unparalleled enthusiasm. With its harmonious interfaith relations—including a tolerant Muslim community and a thriving Protestant evangelical presence—the anticipation united the nation like never before. The three months leading to the Pope's arrival gave the country a singular focus, culminating in three days of public holidays declared to celebrate his visit.

The streets were alive with anticipation as crowds lined every route, hoping to catch a glimpse of the Pope waving from his convoy. For three days, the nation stood still—except for the collective energy of hundreds of thousands joining together in faith and celebration.

I volunteered for the night shift in the operations centre—a tactical decision that traded sleep for an unforgettable experience. By daybreak, I was among the 600,000 pilgrims walking to a specially prepared open-air venue to attend the largest Mass Timor-Leste had ever seen.



When asked later, "What was it like?" my answer was simple: **electric**. The energy was palpable. Despite the heat and the massive turnout, the atmosphere was one of joy and unity. The combined efforts of the Army and Police Task Force were exemplary, gracefully guiding crowds that far exceeded expectations. The Timorese people displayed extraordinary kindness, helping each other through the heat and ensuring smooth passage for ambulances and official vehicles.

The seamless collaboration between the Church, the government, and the people demonstrated that Timor-Leste is not only capable of hosting world-class events but also excels in creating moments of profound unity and inspiration.

As I reflect on the infrastructure improvements, the vibrant banners, and the lingering positive energy, I can only say this: Thank you, Pope Francis and Timor-Leste for a truly memorable experience! LTCOL Eric Bettanin – former MCF-A Treasurer, currently posted to Timor-Leste



Other items that may be of interest

321 – review



321 is a new evangelistic resource that has been developed by Speak life and Glen Scrivener.

It is an excellent app that can be opened up with an individual or in a group setting, and provides animated content and presentation videos over 5 sessions.

The structure of the course is built on 3 main ideas.

- 1. God is 3 persons united in love who invites us into relationship with himself
- 2. There are 2 types of humanity those who are in Adam and those who are in Christ.
- 3. We can be united to Adam in his death or united by faith to Christ in his life.

Some strengths of the course are its theological emphasis on God revealed as Trinity, its focus on Jesus and the importance of faith union.

The graphics and video content is attractive and engaging, and the app is super easy to navigate. Scrivener is a winsome and able Australian presenter, who factors in a number of apologetic questions that are raised by his content.

The presentation is interesting, relevant and fast paced, with helpful pauses for reflection and questions. So far I have used the app one to one with a couple of soldiers who have found it extremely helpful.

Speak life has now also produced a book to accompany the online course, and Scrivener has also published an excellent apologetic resource "the Air that we Breathe". Together the app and 2 books are a wonderful resource in sharing the heart of the gospel with those who are open to exploring faith and working through their questions.

If there were one weakness I have with the material is it is that the topical presentation means that although scripture is frequently referred to, in other evangelistic resources the participant is actively encouraged to read a Gospel as part of the course. That said the strength of the material is that it compellingly presents the Gospel of Jesus and invites the participant into relationship with God. I thoroughly recommend it and look forward to running my first 321 group course in the new year!
